

Directions to TRPC Range 146 Pistol Range Road Tallahassee, Florida


Note: Directions start off of Thomasville Road near Market Square

Travel south on Thomasville Road to Bradford Avenue Turn Right on Bradford Avenue to North Monroe Street Turn left on North Monroe Street follow road to Woodville Highway (Apx. 5 miles)

Travel Woodville Highway (SR-363 Apx. 1.6 miles)

Turn Right onto Oak Ridge Road (CR2204) for 1.8 miles. Look for a blue sign saying "Tallahassee Rifle and Pistol Club"

Turn Right on Community Road (this is a dirt road) for Apx. 0.5 miles Turn slightly right onto Pistol Range Rd for Apx. 0.1 miles to TRPC gate. Your have arrived at TRPC on146 Pistol Range Road

Standard rules at Tallahassee Rifle and Pistol Club (TRPC) Turkey Shoot

Safety Rules for Turkey Shoot Range -- Safety is paramount.

- a. Keep all firearms pointed in a safe direction.
- b. Eye and ear protection are required.
- c. The range safety officer will notify shooters when the range is HOT or COLD. Hot -- firing weapon is authorized and COLD -- no shooting is allowed, weapons must be cleared -- meaning remove all ammunition, open breach, and finger remove from trigger. When firearms are not being used, they are to be left with action open.
- d. Keep the finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.
- e. When people are down range Installing, checking or removing targets no gun are to be handle
- f. TRPC is a cold facility. No loaded firearms may be carried on the range except for legal concealed carries and law enforcement officers on official business.
- g. Spouses and minor children may only use the range when accompanied by and under the direct supervision of the Turkey shoot applicant.

2. Firearm Specifications:

- TRPC will provide 12 Gauge shotshell for the Turkey Shoot. The shot size is 8).
- The firearm is 12-gauge only. Choke size will be limited to Full choke, and Modified choke. 12-gauge shotguns will be available from TRPC.
- c. No scopes or tripods allowed.

Target and Distance:

- a. Paper Targets will be used and have "X" Target with a centered bullseye.
- b. The distance to the target is 25 yards. (TBD Not Firm)

4. Scoring:

- a. The winner is determined by whose shot pellet is closest to the center of the target's bullseye.
- b. A panel of judges will determine the winner for each shooting group.

5. Turns and Rounds:

- a. Ten shooters will take respective position as outlined by Target and database document. Once the safety officer has made the range "HOT" all participants can shoot at their respective targets. If a participant shoots the wrong target they are disqualified for that round; however, may purchase a round and shoot with a different group.
- b. The number of shooting groups will depend on the number of winners. For example, if we have ten shooting groups there are ten winners

6. Entry Fee and Prizes:

- Participants' entry fee is \$25.00. This includes first round with target, BBQ lunch, chance to win a Turkey/Ham
- b. Extra shot \$5.00 each with new target and one shotgun round and shoots with a new shooting group. Although in a new shooting group the extra shot will be viewed as part of an original shot.
- c. There will be a raffle for a pistol or rifle.
- d. Half/half tickets will be sold for \$5.00, and the winner will receive half of the money collected.
