79th Anniversary of First US Flag on Mt. Suribachi

A Dedication at "Boots" Thomas Veterans Memorial Park Monticello, Florida February 22, 2024

For those that don't know, there were two flags raised on Mt. Suribachi 79 years ago. The story is of legend now but a Marine from Monticello, Florida, Sgt. Ernest Ivy "Boots" Thomas USMCR helped raise the first flag. A close childhood friend of his, Dr. James Sledge, has kept the story alive. In a prolog to "Call Me No Hero" Dr. Sledge writes,

"Call Me No Hero is the story of two small town boys whose plans for their lives were terribly changed by a world at war. Two boys – one destined for fame, only to be overshadowed by a twist of fate – the other who felt compelled to keep his friend's memory alive. The book's title captures the personality of a modest, responsible, and confident young man described by his company commander as "one of the few born leaders of men I have met."

Dr. Sledge goes on to say, "After his platoon raised the flag and Sergeant Thomas arrived aboard the ship of General Holland Smith, Don Pryor, a CBS correspondent, asked Thomas about raising the flag. The response, "No, Mr. Pryor. The honor belongs to every man in my platoon." The credit was sufficient for all his men to share.

And yes, there was a second flag raising which has become the iconic flag raising photo at Mt. Suribachi.

The ceremony in Monticello at the "Boots" Thomas Veterans Memorial Park had a nice crowd and served a couple of purposes. We changed out the worn out American and Marine Corps flags and with Commander of American Legion, Otto Walker, Post 49, Ed Gifford emceeing the event and Commander Dennis Baker, USN (ret) giving the keynote address. And then Commander Gifford presented a permanent bronze plaque placed next to the Thomas Monument honoring Dr. Sledge for his lifelong personal dedication to preserving Sgt. "Boots" Thomas legacy.



VIETNAM WAR 50th Anniversary Commemoration Tallahassee National Cemetery March 29, 2024

Some of you might not know that the 50th Anniversary Commemoration of the Vietnam War is actually a 10-year celebration. On March 29, 2024, last week. we had our 9th Celebration at the Tallahassee National Cemetery. We have had small and large crowds over the years, but this year was modest, probably 75 in attendance. I am hoping we will have a significant event next year, the 10th and final year of our 50th Anniversary Commemoration. Before next March I hope to put a call out and especially to the public to attend. Stay tuned.

Lt. Colonel Rick Stanford, USMC (Ret) was our keynote and LtCol. Stanford did an outstanding job relaying his time in Vietnam, his commands and although he didn't give a whole lot of detail, he did mention he received a Silver Star and a Purple Heart not long after he arrived in country. LtCol. Stanford spoke directly about his commands and his relationship to other young Marines. He made a pretty strong argument that the 18- to 20-year-olds in Vietnam were a breed apart. Whether or not they were drafted or volunteered they all knew they had a job to do and they did it. They were young, strong, focused and determined young men and women. LtCol. Stanford's speech was inspirational and for those of us that were there we understood. And he left us with a quote that surely represents all of us, he said a friend of his said to him that when someone asks about Vietnam, he replies, "...if you weren't there, I can't explain it to you, if you were I don't have to...".

Our new Tallahassee National Cemetery Director Ms. Eugenia Simmons emceed the ceremony. Butch Topicz led us in the Pledge of Allegiance and a Ms. Judy Lynn Stewart a soloist sang the National Anthem. Thaddeus and Nancy Horbowy, USA Chaplains provided the invocation and the Benediction. She recognized the Vietnam veterans in attendance and distributed the memorial pins to all Vietnam veterans. Michael Slagle presented a Marine Corps wreath and Johnnie Roberts presented the all-branches wreath. We had our Honor Guard present to present colors and the Patriot Guard Riders stood by securing the event. Let's hope we have a grand celebration next year. Here are just a couple of photos.
