Because of the secrecy of the announcements, we did not know Eric's award would be that evening and he had other commitments in Tallahassee, and he could not stay. We stayed that morning and were given four of our awards and Paul Rogerson and I along with Paul's wife Bridget and his sister Nora stayed for the banquet. It was late in the evening when the Department Commander Mr. Furgeson presented the AMVET of the Year Award to me on behalf of Eric.



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Medal of Honor By: This Day in History Submitted by John Folsom

July 12, 1862 – President Abraham Lincoln signs into law a measure calling for the awarding of a U.S. Army Medal of Honor, in the name of Congress, "to such non-commissioned officers and privates as shall most distinguish themselves by their gallantry in action, and other soldier-like qualities during the present insurrection."

The previous December, Lincoln had approved a provision creating a U.S. Navy Medal of Valor, which was the basis of the Army Medal of Honor created by Congress in July 1862. The first U.S. Army soldiers to receive what would become the nation's highest military honor were six members of a Union raiding party who in 1862 penetrated deep into Confederate territory to destroy bridges and railroad tracks between Chattanooga, Tennessee, and Atlanta, Georgia. In 1863, the Medal of Honor was made a permanent military decoration available to all members, including commissioned officers, of the U.S. military. It is conferred upon those who have distinguished themselves in actual combat at risk of life beyond the call of duty. Since its creation, during the Civil War, almost 3,400 men and one woman have received the Medal of Honor for heroic actions in U.S. military conflict. TRIP TO A HISTORIC AIRFIELD

On 22 February 2024, AMVETS Chapter 1776 members Buddy Perryman and David Wilson took a trip to the airfield where the Doolittle Raiders trained for their carrier takeoffs to bomb Japan during WW2. This was one of the most daring raids in all of WW2. The airfield at Eglin AFB FL is the Runway that Jimmy Doolittle and his flyers trained on for their mission to Japan in 1942. The Japanese Leaders had told their people that Japan would never be bombed from the air. Doolittle and the Raiders took off from the deck of the aircraft carrier, USS Hornet in their B-25 bombers. It was a daring move and even though the tactical results were not that great, the strategic results were over the top for both countries. American morale was thru the roof. When asked where the US Bombers took off from President Roosevelt replied "Shangri-La." Japan's leaders lost face. Many historians believe that it forced Japan to plan their mission on Midway Island, resulting in the great American victory that changed the course of the Pacific War. Before the Battle of Midway, Japan had experienced all victories. After Midway, America was on the March toward Japan.

This Runway was of major importance to our winning the war in the Pacific. What a historic place!

The memorial stone says, "This Garden is a living tribute to all of America's Veterans and their families, in silence and respect, this is a place to remember why millions of Americans have fought and died for our liberty and our freedom. Here we renew our promise to fulfill America's sacred duty to never forget. Here we renew our mutual pledge to support them with "Our Lives, our Fortunes and our Sacred Honor." Vietnam Casualties from Putnam County Honored by Palatka Senior High School Class of 1964 and American Legion Post 45

A lot of us don't bother to go to our Class Reunions but some of us do and my Class of 1964 is one of those special classes that draws a pretty good crowd consid-ering we were a class of 229. We just had our 60th Reunion and we had a great turnout. We had a dinner and program for over 80 folks, 57 of those graduating with me in 1964. What makes this class special was summed up by one of our classmates at our 50th reunion when Lynn Henry Weddington was asked what makes our class so special. And she simply said, "Because we all grew up together." And what a joy it is to visit old friends and literally talk about our first-grade class or our third or sixth and especially those high school years. I could go on and on and tell some special stories that we shared but at this reunion we celebrated all our

classmates. We read out all the names of our classmates that have passed, almost half, and we recognized al-most sixty of us that joined the military.

After these presentations were made and before dinner, I had a very special honor to recognize a very special group of veterans that are engraved on a memorial stone on Palatka's Courthouse Square. The Vietnam memorial sits along with all the rest of the memorials honoring fallen veterans from WWI to WWII, Korea and those of the Afghani-stan War. The Vietnam Memorial has a casualty list of twenty-seven Marines and Soldiers that died in Vietnam during the period from 1964 thru 1975.

I have visited this memorial a few times on my trips back home because I know several of these fallen heroes. And after talking to David Wilson, a member of our AMVETS Post 1776 here in Tallahassee, I asked David to do some research on these special casualties from Putnam County as he is doing for sev-

eral counties in our Big Bend area. This is a special passion of David's and in short order he supplied me with a thumb drive that I was able to access and put together a two-volume set of books that chronicles biographies, newspaper articles, military documents and just a lot of information about each and every veteran on this memorial. We plan to present these books to Putnam County Board of County Commissioners along with the Petition mentioned below.

What made this presentation extra special was that after contacting the local American Legion Post 45 they enthusiastically provided a Color Guard to help us give a dignified salute to all these veterans with the ringing of a bronze bell and calling out each and every name. It was quite a solemn moment. And of course, we were able to give just a brief oral summary of these veterans.

Out of our list of casualties we have a Medal of Honor re-

cipient by the name of Robert Henry Jenkins Jr., one of only nine (9) Medal of Honor winners in Vietnam from Florida. We then shared that there were 3 Silver Stars, 23 Purple Hearts; 13 Bronze Stars, 3 Air Medals, 5 Good Conduct medals, and 1 Distin-

guished Service Cross Not too many counties in Florida per capita can match our Heroes service to God and Country.

Then when conducting the research on these 27 heroes we came upon one (1) more. A PFC Johnny Lee Proctor a Marine from Melrose, Florida. I asked the Class to sign a Petition I prepared that our Class of 1964 will present to Putnam County to add one more name to the Memorial. It was gladly signed by those attending and we are hoping to deliver the Petition to the

Putnam County Board of County Commissioners as soon as possible.
