I am hopeful they will meet their goals as November 30th is the last day to order.

I have personally received commitments from three veterans to join and we picked up, just this week, the recruitment brochures Tony designed and sent to the printer. Stay Healthy!

This year was another difficult year for most of us, trying to stay sane and avoid depression has been difficult. We lost a fellow member of AMVETS this last year (to COVID) but as of today I have lost more friends/veterans due to the COVID epidemic and heart attacks.

I know there is much information being published in the news both for and against COVID inoculations. The saddest news I have seen at least three times was individuals refusing to get inoculated and then

came down with the COVID virus and some later died!!! As a child I lived through the breakout of Polio, but I do not recall people refusing to get the Polio vaccine shot and Polio is not prevalent now. I realize getting the COVID vaccine is an individual decision, but it affects all of us – not only spreading the virus but the loss of dear friends.

Heart disease is also a killer and like COVID it does not care about your age ethnic background or whether you are a male or female. I have lost two veteran friends to heart decease! One of these veterans was instrumental in developing the unclassified and classified European email system via two different web networks. It later was also used to deliver defense messages. He was a great technical talent and asset to the government; however, work was more important to him than his health and early this year he had a heart attack and was MEDEVAC to his home in the United States where three months later died of heart complications. The other younger (late 50s) veteran was a heavy smoker and died in his sleep.

Why am I bringing my personal feeling to you is simple -- I am 75 years old and realize my time is near to depart this world, but I do enjoy life, family, and friends my wife and all the little things in life (hobbies, fixing things, traveling). I will not dictate what you should do but I want my friends, veterans, and family to enjoy life as much as I do. That means all of you need primarily take care of yourself and be concerned about our world and live life like you did in your younger days. Be grateful for every day!!!

Honors for the Honor Guard

If you attended the early breakfast, put on by the American Legion Post #13 at their Hall on Lake Ella on Veterans' Day you not only had a great breakfast but enjoyed the Honors bestowed on our own Big Bend Honor Guard. If you didn't attend, you missed a lot of camaraderie. And the American Legion Post #13 deserves a big thank you. I don't know how many years they have been offering this great breakfast, but Val Frailey and his Post do a superb job. They even have local dignitaries serving the veterans as they sidestep through the breakfast line.

There were probably hundreds of veterans attending getting ready for the Parade put on by Vets Inc. I am sorry I didn't get to attend the parade as I heard it was one of the best yet. A shout out to Joe West, not just for this Veterans' Day Parade but his commitment and diligence for putting this parade on for several years. I think few people know the genesis of todays Veterans Day Parade. Several years ago, the City cancelled the Veterans Parade due to rain. This upset a lot of veterans and especially Joe. From there Joe created Vets Inc., and a new Veterans Day Parade took off. I know this because I drove my M38A1 Jeep for four years. And today our Parade is known to be one of the best in the Nation. Kudo's to Joe.

But I digress, the focus of the breakfast was to honor the Big Bend Honor Guard. Just today in trying to help schedule a service for a Marine Dad of a friend of mine I found out this next week the Honor Guard will be performing their 800th service. There are just a few over 2,000 veterans interred at our Tallahassee National Cemetery, but this number is unbelievable for a bunch of veteran volunteers. And you have to know, most of the 150 plus National Cemeteries in the country, our Cemetery is unique to have its own Honor Guard.

An interesting note is their order of service. I was asked today by my friend what is the procedure for the service. I have attended numerous services, but I had to call Jim Geuin, the schedular for the Honor Guard asking him to explain the order of service to me. And for anyone that wants to receive "Honors" at the Tallahassee National Cemetery, you can call on the Branch of Service, e.g., the Marines at their base in Albany, Georgia and ask that a couple of Marines provide Honors, or you can ask, through Jim or even the Funeral Home you are working with to provide the Honors. Honors through our Big Bend Honor Guard consists of a volley of a 21-gun salute, TAPS and presentation of a flag to the family. If you haven't attended one of the services, it truly is a moving experience. After the Honors, the family then has the option to have the Honor Guard Chaplain offer a prayer and or the family can speak and offer a eulogy for the veteran being interred.

Once again, I digress. Please see below a photo I took at the breakfast. Chuck Howell received from Raymond Miller a framed Proclamation from the Leon County Commission, honoring the Big Bend Honor for there service to the Tallahassee National Cemetery. This being one of several much-deserved Honors they have received.

As this is the 20th anniversary of "9-11" we are honoring our fire, medical and law first responders plus we will honor medical professionals (nurses, etc) for their service during the pandemic.

Superintendent Hanna provides five school busses, one for each high school. We expect about 200 HS students from our local Leon County schools, The Combined Color Guard for the Leon County Schools Junior ROTC units will provide Color Guard duties, the Chiles Choir will sing the National Anthem and another Patriotic song, two buglers from Lincoln HS will play "Echo Taps." The Leon County Sheriff's Office will perform Honor Guard duties with "three rifle volleys." Dr Ed Moore will be our keynote speaker and he will speak on "9-11" and the "pandemic" and how they have changed our lives. We will be finished by noon in order to get students back to their schools so that they can catch the busses home.

The Governor and First Lady, Leon County Sheriff McNeil, Tallahassee Police Chief Revell, Fire Chief Gaines and EMS Chief Abrams as well as leaders of Tallahassee Memorial Hospital and Capitol Regional Medical Center have been invited. Gold Star Family members will attend and represent 10 of our fallen heroes. They will be introduced representing their American hero and loved one. Families of three fallen first responders have indicated they will attend and represent fallen heroes. They will represent two deceased Tallahassee Police Department officers and one officer from the Leon County Sheriff's Office.
